Market Situation

Wool Market

- The Eastern Market Indicator (EMI, Australia's primary wool market indicator) has been on a steady upward trend for the past five years.
- The EMI broke historic price levels in late 2018, peaking at 2116 c/kg in mid-August, and closing at 1862 c/kg at the end of the year. The EMI closed at 1963 c/kg on 22 March 2019.
- Australia produced over 360 million kg of wool in 2017/18 and has produced 218 million kg to February 2019.
- NSW is Australia's foremost wool production state, accounting for over a third of the total clip (over 130 million kg in 2017/18).
- If NSW was a country, it would be the second largest producer in the world, behind China.
- Comparing the 2016/17 and 2017/18 seasons, the NSW wool clip was marginally finer whilst slightly more wool was produced.
- In the 2017/18 season, 65% (over 85 million kg) of NSW wool was below 20.5 micron.
- Continuing dry conditions in a number of Australia's key wool production areas is starting to
 have a noticeable impact on wool production, strength and style, with dust penetration impacting
 a number of wools on the market.
- The recent foot-and-mouth disease outbreak in South Africa is causing a level of concern for the trade, with China suspending South African wool imports including those currently in-transit. While this may create a short-term price benefit for Australian woolgrowers, it also produces price volatility & risk throughout the supply chain.
- The overall sentiment in China remains very positive. All Merino wool has been under buying pressure throughout the season but has now possibly entered a period of price sensitivity.
- The ability of Chinese, European and other garment manufacturers to pass on recent price increases seen at local auctions is now required to sustain the current levels (or somewhere close to it). Owing to the rapidity of recent price rises, most manufacturers will have exhausted their cheaper average price purchased at the beginning of the rise. Manufacturers' buying levels for the year have averaged around 1750c, and there will be reliance on passing on the increase to sustain current pricing levels.

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Sheep and lamb market

- The poor conditions that marred 2018 will have a significant impact on sheepmeat supply in 2019.
- Australian lamb slaughter is forecast to be 21.2 million head in 2019 down 7% year-on-year with sheep slaughter to reach 8 million head.
- Both sheep and lamb carcase weights were impacted by the tough conditions and high cost of feed in 2018. This is expected to continue in 2019 with feedstocks depleted and feed demand to remain high until conditions improve.
- The national flock is estimated to have declined 6.1%, by mid-2018 and is forecast to experience a further decline of 3.7% to mid-2019 underpinned by the dry conditions, which have led to substantial drops in marking rates and the extensive culling of ewes and ewe lambs.
- Longer term, high prices across both sheepmeat and wool provide a strong incentive for producers to rebuild their heavily depleted breeding flocks once conditions allow.
- Fortunately, robust international demand and a low Australian dollar will continue to support Australian exports and, in turn, domestic saleyard prices. Records were broken in 2018 as markets around the world competed strongly for Australia's high quality sheepmeat.
- The expectation for supply, and consequently exports, to decline in both Australia and New Zealand will likely see global competition for sheepmeat intensify in 2019.
- The conditions that drove strong prices for well-finished stock last year look likely to remain in place in 2019, particularly whilst conditions remain dry.

Session 1: Maximising Ewe Performance

Take home messages

- 1. Manage ewes according to condition score, and to maintain condition score
- 2. Pregnancy scan to manage ewes according to lambing potential
- Identify, and consider selling opportunities for low priority stock at weaning, and prior to joining if seasonal conditions warrant. Current wool, meat and feed prices mean it will most likely pay to feed ewes, provided that they are productive.
- 4. Ewes that fail to rear in their first two attempts are likely to repeat this behaviour in subsequent lambings
- 5. Understand the nutritional requirements of different classes of stock
- Understand the nutritional value of different feeds and learn how to do a feed budget for your livestock

- Wean lambs at 14 weeks (with a 5 week joining) after imprint feeding
- Weaning weight should be 45% of Standard Reference Weight
- Condition score ewes at weaning and differentially feed if required
- Condition score ewes at least 6 weeks prior to joining. Aim for condition score 3 at joining
- Pregnancy scan ewes for multiples and allocate feed resources accordingly
- Identify ewes that fail to conceive and cull twice dry (some chose to cull if scan dry at all)
- Wet and dry ewes at lamb marking and identify failed to rear ewes – and manage
- Preferentially feed twin-bearing ewes and lamb in smaller mobs in well-sheltered paddocks

Session 2: Mob Size and Marking Rates

Take home messages

- Decreasing twin mob size at lambing by 100 ewes, increases lamb survival by 2.25% per twin lamb or 4.5% lambs marked
- 2. This is regardless of stocking rate (0.5-12 ewes/ha), ewe breed, ewe condition score at lambing (2.4-3.8), feed-on-offer at lambing or paddock characteristics at lambing
- 3. Optimum mob size for twins is approximately half that for singles
- 4. Temporary fencing is a cost effective way to reduce mob size
- 5. Lamb survival and pasture utilisation both benefit from smaller paddocks
- 6. For producers that don't scan or only scan wet/ dry, the optimum mob size is more similar to the twin mob size than the single mob size

- Scan for multiples and differentially manage single and twin ewes
- Allocate twin bearing ewes to the smaller paddocks
- Create a paddock layout that facilitates sub-division using temporary fences
- Keep records of paddock lamb survival results
- Preferentially feed twin-bearing ewes and lamb in smaller mobs in well sheltered paddocks

Session 3: Winning With Weaners

Take home messages

- 1. Monitor weaner health and growth rates to maximise survival
- 2. Know stock feed requirements throughout the year. Use fodder budgeting to match supply and demand.
- 3. Use sown feed options and supplementation to fill feed gaps post weaning
- 4. Consider use of containment areas when paddock feed is limited
- 5. Always do the sums on any feeding decisions

- Prepare lambs for weaning by imprint feeding
- Use best weaning practice according to seasonal conditions
- Weigh stock regularly and have target growth rates
- Conduct feed budgets to plan feed requirements.

 Match feed supply to animal demand
- Alternative feeding strategies such as containment feeding are implemented when necessary
- Select sires with superior ASBVs for early growth, eye muscle depth and fat cover

Session 4: Wool Market Trends and Buying Patterns

Take home messages

- 1. The number of growers declaring their wool needs to increase
- 2. Ensure you complete and submit the National Wool Declaration (NWD) with your clip
- 3. Pain relief is the minimum requirement
- 4. Auction prices are neither at a premium or discount the price you receive is what the complete package is worth on the day
- 5. Know your product and its likely end use

- 100% NWD compliant wool clip
- Arm yourself with knowledge of price and clip status
- Benchmarking works set rolling targets for production and quality improvements
- Consider all wool sale methods
- Be aware of derivatives and forwards talk to your broker to explore your marketing options
- Attend your wool sales and speak to the people buying your wool

Session 5: Making Money from Measuring

Take home messages

- 1. Know your key profit drivers, benchmark your enterprise
- 2. Have clear enterprise production goals to guide management strategies
- 3. Make culling decisions based on measured as well as visual animal performance
- 4. Individual animal management can increase flock productivity and need not be complex
- 5. Use a combination of visual and measured traits when selecting sires

- SMART goals have been defined and drive the management strategy for enterprise improvement
- Cost of production is known and the business is benchmarked to identify areas for improvement
- A plan has been developed to clearly define how individual animal management and associated technology will be cost effectively implemented in the business

Session 6: Dry Times Decision Making

Take home messages

- Work out the probable cost of feeding right through until when the chances of pasture growth are high.
- 2. Check that is makes sense to feed until this point. Anything less is a bonus.
- 3. Keep sheep well fed, there is no money in weight loss.
- 4. Start planning for when seasons improve– check finances and options for restocking.
- 5. Your health is more important than money.

- Know the probability of the length of the dry period and a best and worst-case scenario.
- Calculate cost benefits of feeding for different levels of production.
- Know that you can finance the strategy you employ.
- Monitor condition scores and liveweights.
- Along with assessing financial impacts, keep track of human, plant and equipment and infrastructure impacts.
- Know how far under capacity you are likely to be coming out of the dry period.
- Know your restocking policy including how long will it take and how much will it cost.
