

Strategic prevention

Consult the LiceBoss website to develop a biosecurity plan. Key elements of a biosecurity plan may include:

- prevent sheep straying with stockproof fences and clean musters.
- work cooperatively with neighbours.
- eradicate current infestations.
- assume introduced sheep (including strays) are lousy and manage accordingly with treatments and guarantine.
- avoid split shearings.
- apply treatments effectively.
- monitor regularly.
- shearing is the best time to attempt eradication.

Tactical response

Consult LiceBoss and/or seek professional advice on actions required for treatment. Steps to consider include:

- choose a treatment application method that can be done effectively on your property.
- ensure equipment is suitable and set up correctly.
- ensure the operator is trained.
- choose the appropriate chemical to suit the application method.
- treat every sheep correctly.
- follow safety recommendations.

Likelihood

Lice infestations cost Australian sheep producers more than \$107 million per year in lost wool production, reduced quality and treatment.

Likely triggers for lice infestation:

- boundary fences that are not stockproof.
- introduction of purchased rams and ewes.
- sheep returned from agistment or stray sheep returned from neighbours.
- neighbours having lice-infested sheep.
- travelling stock moving along boundary fences.
- when past treatment has been poorly applied.
- when lice-resistant chemicals have been used for past treatments.







Impact

- Sheep bite at flanks, scratch head with back feet, rub against posts, trees and fences.
- Pulled and rubbed wool along sides and flanks, and matted and cotted wool.
- Fleece value reduced by \$3–10/head due to:
 - lower weights and yields
 - yellowing and dullness
 - decreased processing performance.
